Description

The Maximizing Options to Advance Informed Choice for HIV Prevention (MOSAIC) project is funded by PEPFAR/USAID.

The project aims to help **adolescent girls and young women (AGYW)** prevent HIV by accelerating the **introduction and scale-up of new pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP) products.**

MOSAIC is committed to a process of creating change that is principled, **led by** and **designed with young people**, and acknowledges the lived realities of those it serves and collaborates with.

MOSAIC's goal is to accelerate access to new PrEP products...



...toward a multi-method market

Guiding principles

- 1. Examine and challenge power
- 2. Make labor visible
- 3. Embrace diverse perspectives
- 4. Prioritize responsiveness to local context
- 5. Center the safety and well-being of those most affected

Being seen as an equal

- Meaningful youth engagement (MYE) means seeing adolescent girls and young women and the community as shared partners and leaders in the MOSAIC project.
- It also means involving young people's ideas, expertise, and experiences.
- This is important because their perspectives and input have the power to impact the decisions that will affect their communities. In large part, this will affect the perception and uptake of PrEP.

Meaningful youth engagement

An inclusive, intentional, mutually respectful partnership between youth and adults whereby power is shared, respective contributions are valued, and young people's ideas, perspectives, skills, and strengths are integrated into the design and delivery of programs, strategies, policies, funding mechanisms, and organizations that affect their lives and their communities, countries, and the world. (USAID Youth In Development Policy)

The NextGen Squad (NGS) helps shape and inform MOSAIC activities

To operationalize meaningful youth engagement, MOSAIC constituted a youth advisory committee

The NGS is a team of **youth advocates** under the age of 30 who have been hired as project staff in nine MOSAIC countries: Eswatini, Kenya, Lesotho, Namibia, Nigeria, South Africa, Uganda, Zambia, and Zimbabwe.

The NGS holds MOSAIC **accountable** to its plans, actions, and monitoring, evaluation, and learning efforts so it remains:

- responsive to young people's needs, preferences, and lived experiences
- inclusive of the diversity of AGYW
- meaningfully engaging young people in research and research utilization



The NGS support team and mentors...



Provides additional support and oversight for all activities

Provides further learning and capacity/skills building opportunities in-country and reinforces learnings

Provides overall coordination of activities; regular check-ins; and support before, during, and after NGS requests

*This structure highlights support for global activities. For in-country activities, the NGS mentor/supervisor will come before the support team.

Full participation & youth leadership

The aim is to maximize contributions of the NGS by using a multipronged approach that ensures:

- Activities are values-driven
- NGS members, their mentors, senior staff, and partners have core skills
- Best practices in engagement are implemented

Values-driven activities

We strive to ensure that:

- Values are critically examined
- Equitable partnerships are championed by leadership
- Time and energy is invested
- Culture of urgency is shifted
- Opportunities are prioritized and selected deliberately
- Lived experiences and expertise are valued
- Feelings are validated



Demand Creation & PrEP Positioning in MOSAIC

Marie Merci Niyibeshaho, LVCT Health

Co-developing the PrEP category with AGYW

While most positioning and creative testing processes engage end users after development, we **were regularly engaged to provide feedback and input** from the onset of the process.

With the learnings from previous PrEP demand generation efforts, we were brought on board to ensure that we brought forward the strongest, most resonant insights. **Our involvement also created space for powerful themes to emerge.**





NextGen Squad pushed the positioning direction further

Working Session 1: Trends & Themes

We dug into cultural trends and key themes that arose in Year 1, such as Afro optimism, self-care, and influencers.

Working Session 2: Pushing on Our Direction

In this session, we further probed the squad on their thoughts about our direction.

As a young African girl, there's a future out there for me. There's a space for me in this world. There's room for me to do great things. **There is more hope now compared to before for us as young women.**

The NGS provided critical input to MOSAIC's positioning strategy for the PrEP category for AGYW in three areas...



Culture

Young women today are embracing duality—they are working hard, recognizing their own strength and nurturing their wellbeing.



Consumer

Young women do not want us to shy away from or sugarcoat harsh realities, but rather to acknowledge.



Category

We need to reframe the PrEP category away from the medical, towards self-care as a collective and continuous act.

A segment of the text we discussed with our NGS in Workshop 2:


"When we look at younger women in Africa, we have to understand that the onus is on them to keep going, keep working, keep smiling.

They can't depend on anyone else but themselves.

Their safety is not a given. Their health is not a given. Thus, **every** day is a balancing act of juggling different needs with limited resources.

They see there is more freedom today. More opportunities and colour and representation. More to be excited about. And they are! But **it remains a balancing act of juggling what you can with what you should, what you want and what you have.**

So, in order to affect real change, we have to show that we understand this."

Catalyzing access to new prevention products to stop HIV

The CATALYST study, under the MOSAIC project, will use mixed methods to characterize and assess the implementation of an enhanced service delivery package providing choice of PrEP products among women at PEPFAR delivery sites in Kenya, Lesotho, South Africa, Uganda, and Zimbabwe.

PrEP Products in CATALYST Study







OBJECTIVE1

Characterize the implementation of an enhanced service delivery package for PrEP choice and assess individual-, provider-, facility-, community- and health system-level facilitators and barriers of the implementation process

OBJECTIVE 2

Describe patterns of PrEP use and use effectiveness in the context of PrEP choice and assess sociodemographic and contraceptive use correlates of PrEP use patterns

OBJECTIVE 3

Describe clinically relevant indicators among PrEP users, including rates of HIV infection and drug resistance among PrEP users who acquire HIV following PrEP exposure

CATALYST study launch

CATALYST begins May 30: Lesotho

June 21: Zimbabwe

) July 25: Uganda

Aug 11: South Africa

Following a staggered launch schedule, the CATALYST study is officially underway in all five countries.

Stage I

In Stage I of the study, participants are offered a choice of **oral PrEP** or the **PrEP ring**.

Stage II

In each country, Stage II will add CAB PrEP once it has been approved by the national regulatory authority and donated product is available on site.

- Co-facilitation of Technical Working Groups when invited by Zimbabwe's Ministry of Health and Childcare and the National AIDS Council
- Development of professional skills, including the opportunity to facilitate CATALYST study trainings or lead Empathways workshop



Engaging young people in CATALYST study advisory boards



CATALYST study teams are establishing study youth and community advisory boards (CABs) in each country.

The advisory mechanism structure is tailored to the needs and context of each country, and the terms of reference are established collaboratively with each group. For example:

Kenya

Formed **one national YAB** and **three county CABs**, one for each county where the six study sites are located.

Lesotho

Established a diverse **14member national YAB** led by the Lesotho NextGen Squad member. Leveraged existing health center committees to **establish three CABs**, one at each site.

Zimbabwe

Formed a CAB and YAB for each of the six study sites. The **six YABs** consist of **40 AGYW** and the **six CABs** consist of **39 members** from diverse backgrounds representing the communities surrounding the study sites.

Uganda

Formed three regional CABs

-one for each region where seven study sites are located -and one national CAB, called the National Advocacy Task Team. These CABs have diverse representation, including AGYW and KP community members.

Formation of YABs & CABs in CATALYST

Youth Advisory Board

- Recruitment: Young people (18 to 30 years), intentionally including LGBTQI+, individuals with disabilities, PrEP users, and female sex workers
- Members must be willing and able to advocate for choice and youthfriendly services, such as:
 - HIV prevention
 - Sexual and reproductive health rights
 - Gender equality
 - Local concerns of young people

Goal: Ensure the voices of the youth understood and considered at all levels and support the effective and meaningful participation of young people in MOSAIC implementation

Community Advisory Board

- Recruitment: Community leaders, including retired professionals, priests, traditional doctors, and community health workers
- Leverage existing health center committees to establish CABs at each study site

Goal: Serve as advocates for the community and facilitate a transparent, meaningful, collaborative, mutually beneficial, and sustainable relationship with stakeholders during CATALYST study implementation

Functions of CABs

- Ensure community members are actively involved throughout research and product introduction
- Provide input on local relevance and acceptance
- Ensure community priorities and perspectives are considered
- Ensure the safety of study participants by providing oversight and direction
- Represents the interests and needs of end-users and community-stakeholders



Lesotho Community Advisory Board

Function of YABs

- Address concerns, barriers, and issues of AGYW related to product introduction
- Participate in capacity-strengthening activities and service delivery trainings
- Support the planning, organizing, and hosting of youth workshops to mobilize participation in CATALYST activities.
- Contribute to development and review of CATALYST demand-generation materials and activities

Key takeaways from meaningful youth engagement in MOSAIC & CATALYST


- Meaningful youth engagement is a commitment to a process of creating change that is principled and led by and designed with young people
- CABs—including parents and caregivers—give the project visibility and representation at community level
- There must be continuous engagement with young people to fully incorporate their inputs and instill ownership in the project
- Requirements for YAB and CAB roles need to be clearly articulated to members and relevant stakeholders
- Facilitate MYE opportunities at various professional or academic levels (e.g., local, national, and international forums)





PrEP4Teens Initiative Receives Over \$300K to Launch Social Marketing Campaign

A local sexual health campaign for adolescents recently received \$310,000 in funding from the Chicago Department of Public Health, Alphawood Foundation, Northwestern University Clinical and Translational Sciences Institute, and the Third Coast Center for AIDS Research. The campaign, called PrEP4Teens, is led by Kathryn Macapagal, PhD, associate professor of medical social sciences at Northwestern University, and Jim Pickett of Jim Pickett Consulting and senior advisor at AVAC Global Advocacy for HIV Prevention. The Initiative alms to educate LGBTQ+ teens in the Chicago area about PrEP and empower them to access sexual healthcare through a blend of art, advocacy, and science.

"It means the world to me to see this campaign come to life," said Macapagal. "Folks who do HIV prevention research rarely get to see the programs they develop actually materialize outside a research setting, so to see this translation from science to practice in three years is really astonishing."



Teenagers and young adults (13–24 years old) accounted for 20% of new HIV diagnoses in 2020 6,135 young people diagnosed with HIV. In Illinois, young people ages 13–24 represent the seco lowest percentage of PrEP users among all age groups. This campaign intends to inform teens a PrEP, educate them about local clinics offering HIV prevention and treatment services, and play a

in reducing the number of young people impacted by HIV.

"I believe deeply that young people deserve information about and access to sexual health services that have the potential to improve their wellbeing," said Pickett. "And our team is committed to

following the lead of teens, who know best how to reach their peers."

In the spring of 2018, just before PrEP was approved for adolescents by the FDA, Macapagal learned through her own research there were very few LGBTQ+ teens who were aware of PrEP. This motivated her to develop two research projects focused on PrEP for this population, including the study that kicked off the PrEP4Teens work in 2020. On this project, she partnered with Pickett, an Internationally-recognized HIV prevention advocate who led Chinago's DrEDAI rule campaign for






Vision


